First round of the contest is over

Today the contestants had chance to test their skills in challenging tasks. Early in the morning, they were divided into groups and seated in front of the computers where they prepared their desktop environment. We didn't want to disturb them with our silly questions, so instead we talked to RNDr. Michal Forisek, PhD. who is the chairman of scientific committee.

You participate in and organize lot of similar events, what is your motivation to work with young talents?

Well, that's a hard one, but I enjoy it in the first place. I grew up in similar environment, because I was a contestant in many high-school programming competitions and when I came to the university I've started to get involved in organizing these events and it lasted out until today.

What are your experiences from these contests and what do you think about the quality of this year's contestants?

I've got many experiences from highschool programming contests, noticeably from years 98-99 when I was finishing the school. And as for these contestants, CEOI is one of the most difficult competitions, because this is the region, where all of the countries have great programmers, they send here the best ones and therefore the difficulty of the problems must be adjusted to their level. I think it is even more difficult than IOI where are countries from all over the world.

Last year you've finished your PhD in theoretical computer science. What is it's connection to these contests?

It has more or less some connection with them, because I've been developing methods of evaluation for these kinds of competitions.

Do you enjoy programming as a hobby or is it more like work or something you "must" do?

Well it's more like fun for me, because I am a lecturer in the first place, I don't code for living. But I would say it's not a hobby, because it is very important to have other outdoor activities. I like to go to the countryside and especially enjoy hiking, so I am very much looking forward to the trip to High Tatras.

Shortly after the first round everyone was discussing problem sets with their teammates. We've asked Klaas-Hendrik from Germany about the difficulty of tasks. "It was very difficult, I was able to submit only solution and I don't think it is correct." he said.
